

Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

It is very exciting that Grand Chapter of Oregon has officially designated Service Dogs as one of our primary philanthropic charities. WGM Melissa and WGP John have chosen PAVE Paws Assisting Veterans to be their "pet" charity.

Freedom isn't Free. Thousands of military men and women come back home forever changed by war. Approximately 2.5 million armed services members have been deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan and other places. 17 % of them are suffering from PTSD. 22 veterans are taking their own lives every single day and that number is increasing. For the last few years, here have been more military suicides than combat deaths. I find this information disturbing which is why I am so excited that OES is in a position to help our veterans by supporting PAVE.

PAVE is a small organization that trains service dogs for veterans with Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome (PTSD), Traumatic Brain Injury (TIP), and other disabilities. Unlike other service dog organizations that mass produce dogs, PAVE must customize each dog to meet the specific needs of the veteran receiving it.

PAVE Paws Assisting Veterans places dogs, at no charge, with disabled veterans with a wide array of disabilities. PAVE operates on donations and grants and receives NO government funding. All of these dogs are trained to provide support in every imaginable social situation. They are trained to wake the veteran from nightmares, redirect the veteran during a PTSD episode, put a barrier between the veteran and the public if needed, reduce hyper-vigilance through teamwork, prevent panic in public. Dogs can also be trained to pick up items, open doors, push elevator buttons, pull a wheelchair, assist with balance, etc. Most importantly service dogs can help to regulate emotional states.

OES has an opportunity to make a big difference in the lives of veterans by supporting PAVE. PAVE is dedicated to raising and training service dogs. PAVE does not have a staff to solicit funds from donors or to send mass mailings requesting donations. All of that takes money and PAVE spends their money on their dogs and veterans. This is where OES can help. If we raise funds on their behalf, PAVE would be able to hire more trainers to train more dogs for more disabled veteran.

Our goal is to raise enough money to sponsor a veteran so that he/she can get a dog. It costs about \$25,000 per year to train a service dog and place it with a veteran. If each chapter could hold a fund raiser and raise \$500, we could make our goal.

As Co-Chair of the Service Dog Committee, along with Ninja, my service dog puppy in training, we are here to help as well as to ask you for your help. If there is anything we can do to help you and your chapter support PAVE, please let us know.

We hope you will support these brave men and women who have done so much for us. They have sacrificed much for you and me. They have worked too hard for the American way of life to be deprived of it themselves.
